But before you get started on your Cowboy Adventure take a few moments to set the scene using items you already have available in your home? Why? Setting the scene will not only enhance the mood, it'll give you the opportunity to get all of your little cowpokes and cattle rustlers involved in the experience. Here are some scene-enhancing tips:

SCENE-SETTING TIP #1

BRING YOUR COWBOY ADVENTURE TO LIFE

Now that you've set the scene, and printed out the crafts and recipes, it's time to get started. For this adventure, you and your family are a group of cowboys who have just arrived in a raucous old west town. This town is full of cattle ranchers, outlaws, and other colorful types straight out of a John Wayne movie. Below are step-by-step details for creating this experience. Follow the instructions as written, or use them as a launching point and let your imagination be your guide

STEP #1

Pick your character. What kind of cowboy are you? Are you an outlaw? Are you a villain? And, while you're at it, what's your horse's name? You can be a real cowboy right out of the history books or you can make up a new character.

STEP #2

Make your cowboy costume. Follow the directions in the tool kit to create your awesome cowboy costume. If you don't want to make this costume, raid your closet for hats, coats, bandanas, and other clothes you can use to bring your character to life.

STEP #3

Make some gold. Follow the instructions for our Diggin' Up Treasure craft and make your own gold. After all, you'll need some gold to pay for things when you enter this frontier town.

STEP #4

Rustle up some grub. While part of your posse is making the treasure, have a few others head to the chuck wagon (i.e. the kitchen) to make some Armadillo Potatoes. Follow our easy recipe to make this delicious treat.

STEP #5

Go west, young family. Gather up living room chairs and arrange them on the floor to create that prairie wagon we mentioned before. Have everyone take turns at the reins.

STEP #6

Let the adventure begin! Now that you've made your gold, put on your costume, and









cooked up some grub, it's time to get things started. Hop into your wagon and head for town. Remember, there are a lot of unsavory characters in this town. Is anyone watching you with a stealing eye on your gold?

STEP #7

Grab a bite to eat. In the old west town, the saloon is where everything happens. Your saloon can be another room of your home, like your dining room. STEP #8

STEP #9

MATERIALS

- 2 white egg carton cups
- Black marker
- Wire coat hanger
- Tape
- Denim shorts
- Button-down shirt
- Pair of jeans
- Western-style belt
- Newspaper
- Clip suspenders

MATERIALS

- Large topless cardboard box
- Utility knife
- Sheet of cardboard
- Acrylic paints
- Paintbrushes
- White leggings
- Craft glue
- Small cardboard box
- 2 pink egg carton cups

INSTRUCTIONS

1. From the cardboard sheet, cut out the cowboy boots and the bull's ears, horns, two back legs and a tail. Paint the ears brown with pink centers, then paint the back legs and tail brown and white; also paint brown spots on the white



- 2. To make the bull's body, take the large box, turn it upside down, and cut a childsize hole in the bottom. Using brown and white paint, paint the box. Glue the bull's tail and back legs onto the body.
- 3. To make the head, take the smaller box, and cut two nostril holes in it. Insert pink egg carton cups and glue in place. Cut two eye sockets in the box and glue white egg carton cups in place. Draw black irises in the centers of the cups. Paint the entire head white and brown. Cut two slits on both sides of the head, and glue the horns into the top slits and the ears into the bottom ones.



4. To attach the head to the body, create a neck by twisting a wire coat hanger into a spring. Cut a hole in the back of the smaller box, poke one end of the hanger through and tape in place. Make a hole in the front of the large box near the top, poke the other end of the hanger through, and tape it in place.



5. To put it all together: Have your child wear the cow-print leggings, denim shorts and button-down shirt. Run a belt through the front loops of the jeans and the back of your child's denim shorts and fasten. Have your child step into the bull's body, lay the suspenders over his shoulders, then clip them to the front and back opening of the box. Lightly stuff the pair of jeans with newspaper and insert the painted cowboy boots into the jean legs (taping them in place, if necessary). Accessorize with a rope, bandanna, cowboy hat, and gloves.

Variations:

For a quicker face, simply paint on the eyes and nose. leggings, and make the boots and horns yellow.










Kids can pan for silver and gold right in their own backyard with this summertime sandbox activity.





MATERIALS

- 20 or so small rocks
- 1 teaspoon each of silver and gold acrylic paint
- Waxed paper

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. To set it up, first place 20 or so small rocks and 1 teaspoon of silver acrylic paint in a sealable container. Shake the container to coat the rocks, then set them on waxed paper to dry.
- 2. Next, rinse out the container, add another batch of rocks plus 1 teaspoon of gold acrylic paint, and repeat the process.
- 3. After the rocks have dried completely, bury them in your sandbox and send kids out with toy shovels and sifters to find the treasure.

Variations:

For a fun party game, give kids 1 minute to uncover as many nuggets as they can.

LAND WAX WHAT I LAND WALL SHIP









Set out a big dish of these roly-poly, bread crumb-topped armadillos, and it won't be long before you hear a chorus of "Please pass the potatoes!"





INGREDIENTS

- 1/4 cup bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- Salt and pepper to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Heat the oven to 450°. In a bowl, mix together the bread crumbs, cheese, paprika, salt and pepper, and 1 tablespoon of olive oil. Set the mixture aside.
- 2. Transform each potato half into an armadillo by cutting 9 or so notches 1/2 to 1 inch deep in the rounded top. For each armadillo, cut a square of aluminum foil big enough to loosely wrap around it, brush the center with olive oil, then place the potato on it, flat side down. Sprinkle the top with some of the crumb mixture, pressing it into the grooves, then seal the potato in the aluminum foil.
- 3. Arrange all of the foil-covered potatoes on a baking sheet and bake them for 40 to 45 minutes. Open the pouches carefully they will be hot and full of steam. Makes 1 dozen armadillos.
